Dear Tri-County Students and Families,

The end of the year is fast approaching. It's been a successful year with several celebrations. I appreciate all the kindness and support each of you has extended to our school staff. ### **CLASSROOM HAPPENINGS**

A lot has been going on in Mrs. Snakenberg's classroom this year!

In Economics, we are currently studying supply and demand. Students got to see this illustrated during an activity where they took turns pretending to be buyers and sellers of rare gemstones. During each round of the game, students were faced with challenges that affect the price of stones - shortages, surpluses, and substitutions - and had to adjust their profit margin and prices accordingly. The entire class has also been keeping track of stock prices for ten different companies of their choosing to see if they would manage to come out on top. Some students have done very, very well, making thousands of (imaginary) dollars in profit, and others have done the opposite, losing thousands. The stock market has been on a bit of a rollercoaster recently, so it has been very interesting to see how that is reflected in the students' projects.

In Civics, the seventh grade is currently going through a unit on US geography, including states, capitals, and major industries. Earlier in the semester, we discussed the branches of government, civil rights, and where the idea of government even comes from. Students also researched a different country, learning about how its government functions compared to ours.

In high school Government, students wrote letters to different elected officials earlier in the year, expressing their positions on whatever topics they wished. Many chose to write to Governor Reynolds, though some wrote to their senators or state representatives. We have recently been discussing the war against Ukraine and the global implications of the conflict. Students completed projects over presidents past and present, as well as doing research into different political parties, both major and minor.

In Personal Finance, students have learned about sales taxes, comparison shopping for things like homes and vehicles, how insurance works, balancing checkbooks, smart consumer spending, credit cards, and where all of that money that gets taken out of their paycheck goes.

### High School Golf Interview Ms. Nicole Craig - 2021/2022 Golf coach

*Q: Why do you think students should join golf?* Ms. Craig: "To learn a new sport."

*Q: Did you play golf in high school?* Ms. Craig: "No."



### Q: What do you want to see throughout the golf season?

Ms. Craig: "I am hoping to see kids make individual progress, seeing them help their teammates, and make memories with their friends."

### Q: What do you enjoy most about golf?

Ms. Craig: "I have never played before but I like to take walks with my dog, so hoping for good exercise."

### Q: What inspired you to coach golf?

Ms. Craig: "Well I was hoping someone with more experience would step up to do it but since no one did, I thought I should so this opportunity didn't go away for the kids. I heard lots of excitement from the kids about golf so I wanted to coach it so they had the opportunity to play."

*Q: What other sports have you coached?* Ms. Craig: "Volleyball."

### Q: In your opinion, how will golf benefit athletes?

Ms. Craig: "From what I have read and talked with other coaches, golf can be an extremely mental game that you play in your head. Being able to overcome those challenging thoughts and work through their struggles will help them in other sports with the mental toughness side of things. The athletes cannot get stuck on one hole or one swing. They have to coach themselves during the meet so they need to keep a positive attitude and be able to anticipate what factors may be on that particular hole, such as wind speed, sandpits, or water. Golf also uses a lot of core muscles which can only improve their other sports by having that strong core."

### Junior High Track & Field Mrs. Jill Hall - 2021/2022 JH track coach

*Q: Did you participate in track in JH/HS?* Mrs. Jill Hall: "Yes, both in junior high and high school."

### Q: How would track benefit athletes?

Mrs. Jill Hall: "Track isn't just about getting faster, everything we do will be tied to enhancing overall athleticism. Higher athleticism leads to greater adaptability, which leads to a well rounded athlete. A lot of track and field events are solo, which means when it's time to step up to the line, you control the outcome. They won't always have a teammate to help control the outcome of their races/field events. This will help athletes learn how to execute under pressure. Exposure to these situations will most definitely transfer to their ability to execute in the real world."

### Q: What other sports have you coached? Have you coached track before?

Mrs. Jill Hall: "This will be my first year coaching JH track. I have volunteered over the years at the youth level in a variety of different sports, but never have I had the opportunity to coach at this level."

### Q: Why should students join track?

Mrs. Jill Hall: "Track & Field is such a good overall sport. It develops speed, agility, explosiveness, and endurance. All of these attributes are critical to success in other sports, too."

### Q: What inspired you to be a track coach?

Mrs. Jill Hall: "Growing up, I played whichever sport was in season. There is no question that exposure helped shaped who I am today. I want kids to experience that, and see all of the opportunities that Tri-County has to offer. At the Junior High level, Track & Field is a new sport. Our youth level offers Basketball, Softball/Baseball, Volleyball, and Football. This alone has made me beyond excited to introduce something new and help develop a program that will continue into the High School level."

### Q: What is your favorite part of track? (meets, throwing, etc.)

Mrs. Jill Hall: "I love it all, there isn't a part of Track and Field that doesn't make me want to throw on a pair of running shoes and join in on the fun! I always say, if you can get through the first few weeks of practice, you'll see what all of the hype is about once you experience your first meet."

### Q: What would you like to see most this track season?

Mrs. Jill Hall: "My main focus this year is to get as many kids out for track as I can. I want them to see what it's like to be part of a team, the feeling you get when you PR, and the feeling that comes when you succeed at something that you never thought you could do. I want them to see growth from the first day of practice to the last. Seeing that progression = success in my book."
