As we enter Fall, I am pleased to report our Fastbridge testing for the Fall term has been completed in grades K-11th. Our interventions have been planned with help from our AEA consultant, Gary Jarmes (Mathematics). We are underway with our SEL (Social emotional learning) groups/individual sessions with our AEA Behavioral Interventionist, Amy Molyneux. This school year we are focusing on mathematics and writing interventions. Our secondary teacher, Vince Hrasky has planned our secondary writing interventions which all students in grades 7th-11th will be completing. Our 3rd-11th grade classroom teachers are incorporating writing tasks into their curriculum twice a month with timely feedback to our students on the writing process. These decisions were data-driven based on our ISASP scores and data analyzation of our formative assessments. We are looking forward to growth in all of our students at TC.

The elementary students in grades PK-6th took a field trip to What Cheer Public Library at the end of September. They were given the opportunity to sign up for a library card with parental permission, learned about the resources available at our local library, and had a snack during their time at the public library. I would like to applaud Carolyn Becker for helping us with this trip.

Our secondary BIG BUDDY volunteers are eagerly assisting the elementary classroom teachers and students. I value this relationship and opportunity for both groups of students. It is a positive experience to have a BIG BUDDY in our elementary classrooms. The requirements for BIG BUDDY's are to have an open study hall period, remain eligible, and have no missing or late assignments.

Stay tuned for Fire Prevention Week in October. Remember to discuss fire safety with your children at home, have your child memorize their home address, and develop a fire safety plan including where to meet outside in case of a fire.

Lastly, our three year old preschool program has been welcomed with open arms. This is a great opportunity to have at TC and I appreciate the continued support.



STUDENTS OF THE MONTH By Gyasilyn Purdy


Marley Van Patten

Fastbridge Assessments

Tri-County continues to use Fastbridge reading, math and social and emotional needs assessments. K-6 classrooms, Title 1 classroom and special education classrooms are using Fastbridge for weekly and bi-weekly progress monitoring to check reading fluency and math with our students. Teachers will organize groups when all testing is completed to give additional instruction time for math and reading in our WIN groups (What I Need groups). Once groups are formed, we will use problems and games from Fastbridge to get each student closer to their benchmark level.

CBMreading (Curriculum-Based Measurement for Reading) is an evidence-based, one-minute assessment used for universal screening in English (Grades 1-6), and for frequent progress monitoring (Grades 1-6). It is a simple and efficient procedure. FAST provides benchmark targets for performance to help identify students at-risk for academic failure.CBMreading assessments are predictive of risk, quick to administer, and sensitive to growth. Substantial research evidence demonstrates that CBMreading is a robust indicator of reading development and a useful predictor of student performance on state tests. CBMreading is an index of word reading efficiency, which is an important ability that facilitates reading comprehension. Students who read a grade-level passage with efficiency are better able to use their cognitive resources to comprehend while reading.



CBMreading is used to screen students up to five times per year. Benchmark standards (i.e., "cut scores" or "targets") are built into the system to assist in determining which students are at-risk for academic failure versus those who are on track to be successful. Students with deficit achievement are quickly identified for additional intervention. The data also identify and inform instructional decisions for on-track and high-performers.

The profiles of students' skill strengths and areas of difficulty can provide useful information to plan instruction. Each individual and group report within FAST is available instantly, expediting the process for teachers.

Kindergarten students are tested on early reading strategies as well. Things included are: letter names, letter sounds, parts of a book, beginning short words such as cat, map, can.

Fastbridge Assessments cont'd

Progress Monitoring

CBMreading is uniquely designed to accommodate quick, easy, frequently delivered assessments (e.g., weekly, biweekly), which provide useful data to monitor student progress and evaluate response to instruction. Progress monitoring helps teachers evaluate instructional effects and determine if differentiated instruction and interventions are effective. Students that receive Title 1 or Special Education services will be progress monitored weekly.

Assessments Included

Both FASTtrack Reading and FASTtrack Math include a combination of specific and broad measures. This combination allows the FastBridge system to identify the best focus of instruction for an entire class as well as for small groups of students who need intervention. The following assessments measure the specific and broad skills at each grade level:

Screening

SAEBRS can be used to identify students who are at risk for general, social, academic, and emotional behaviors at least three times a year. By evaluating in which of the three specific domains a student is at risk, educators may determine what type of supports are most appropriate and which problem behaviors should be prioritized through intervention. For instance, if a student is only at risk for emotional problems, then a school may decide to target emotional behaviors via the application of social-emotional learning (SEL) programs.

Target Population

The SAEBRS is designed for universal screening of student risk for social-emotional and behavior problems for students in kindergarten through twelfth grade.
